BACKGROUND

MEDIMUN

MEDIMUN is a United Nations simulation for teenagers aged 15-19. Students assume the role of delegates, representatives of a UN Member State which has been assigned to them and discuss, construct, and debate resolutions after extensive research into their allocated country's policies. These resolutions or documents detailing their suggestions and solutions to world issues provide the basis for multifaceted debate and constructive discussions on varied topic areas. MEDIMUN is an accredited THIMUN conference, which approves similar conferences held around the globe, in which young people have the opportunity to gain knowledge not only of individual countries, but also of the function of the United Nations through a hands-on experience. Directors, usually teachers, are responsible for the training of delegates and leading the delegation of students with reference to the 'Parliamentary Procedure' of the UN which helps to ensure that debate takes place in a formal setting. MEDIMUN is the largest and oldest MUN conference in Cyprus and is run on a not-for-profit basis by volunteers.

THE CITY OF NICOSIA

Nicosia is the capital of Cyprus and the island's economic and cultural centre. Relatively small, Nicosia boasts a medieval walled city, countless historical and religious monuments and an increasingly diverse population. The size of the city also deems it very safe as well as easy to navigate on foot, while also offering a uniquely multi-cultural setting for the MUN conference.

Visitors can wander the meandering Venetian streets and pedestrianised areas which are filled with tiny shops and cafes. Multiple museums showcase every aspect of Cyprus' varied history, from antiquity to the British colonial period.

Participants engage in profound discussions and networking in a multicultural setting, mastering complex global issues. 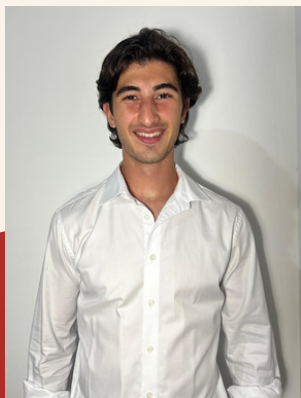

BEING A DELEGATE - A UN SIMULATION

The MEDIMUN conference follows a United Nations-style framework, with delegates adhering to designated debate procedures, formal terms, and voting practices.

PREPARATION

A morning workshop on Saturday, November 15th, will acquaint participants with essential rules and conference structure. Refer to the Delegates' Handbook on our website under "Resources" for in-depth information. Please read it before attending the Workshop.

Following the Workshop, delegates research their committee-assigned issues and the policies of their represented countries, adopting a genuine UN diplomat's stance.

RESOLUTION WRITING

Delegates draft resolutions after in-depth issue research. During the conference, they refine their ideas through discussions and merge aspects of different resolutions into one. The Student Officer Team offers guidance, and the Approval Panel approves merged resolutions. Approved resolutions undergo debate and voting.

The Security Council is the most powerful element of the United Nations. Its purpose is to maintain international peace and security in accordance with the principles of the UN, investigating any disputes that could lead to international conflict. With the existence of a threat to peace, the Council could take military action against an aggressor, or call for the Member States to apply measures which do not involve force, such as economic sanctions. The Council also formulates plans for the establishment of a system to regulate armaments.

The Historical Security Council HSC

In an attempt to highlight the importance of learning from the past and avoiding all those errors which have cost the world dearly, MEDIMUN includes the Historical Security Council (HSC) in its committees. The HSC is essentially a simulation of the Security Council, but instead of discussing current topics of the world agenda, it revisits old problems and considers all the aspects related to them as if they were happening now.

The HSC discussions are based on historical facts; yet participants will be required to formulate their own solutions to the topics on the agenda without considering the eventual outcome as this actually happened.

This committee will most strongly appeal to creative delegates with a particular interest in world history.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS COUNCIL

The League of Nations Council represents one of the earliest attempts at creating a collective system for preserving global peace after the devastation of the First World War. As the executive body of the League, the Council dealt with urgent political disputes brought before it, striving to prevent the outbreak of new conflicts through negotiation, arbitration, and recommendations to the Assembly.

In MEDIMUN, this committee works similarly to the Security Council, providing delegates with the opportunity to explore how international relations were conducted in the interwar period and to reflect on the successes and failures that shaped the evolution of modern multilateralism.

This committee will most strongly appeal to creative delegates with a particular interest in world history.

Enrollment

Each participating school is allowed to bring a maximum of 2 delegations. Further positions can be given upon request and availability. A standard delegation comprises 4 students, with one student assigned to each General Assembly Committee. Additionally, each school can apply for three positions in the special committees, which include the Security Council, Historical Security Council, and League of Nations Council. This results in a total of a maximum of 11 delegates per school.

The allocation of delegates to the special committees will be based on the school's preferences and the availability of positions. Specific countries for the special committees will be allocated after the workshop or at a later stage.



Enrollment

Minimum Participation Requirements

If a school is unable to bring a delegation 10 students, it is strongly encouraged that their students enroll, regardless of their numbers, as a country delegation can still function effectively with fewer participants. However, to ensure the conference closely simulates the proceedings of the United Nations, every effort will be made to fill all positions in a delegation before a school is allocated a second delegation.

It's essential to note that a school must bring a minimum of 4 students who will constitute one delegation. Participants will be assigned their respective countries before the workshop, allowing them to prepare adequately for the Model United Nations conference. This ensures that even if a school has fewer students, they can actively participate in the event and contribute meaningfully to the discussions and simulations.

Attendance at the Workshop is strongly encouraged for local delegates since participation is greatly beneficial to all attendees

Enrollment Process

- 1) Create an account on Medibook, if you already have an account move to step 2.
- 2) Apply to be a School Director on Medibook.
- 3) After being approved as a school director you will be able to select the amount of delegations and special committee delegates you want to have as a school (maximum of 2 delegations and 3 Special Committee delegates).
- 4) After having your delegation amount approved you will be allocated with the countries your school will represent, you can then assign delegates to these countries and in what committee they will represent each country. You will also assign delegates to special committees.
- 5) Payment through Medibook

Delegate Selection Expectations

To ensure a professional and high-standard conference, all participants are expected to meet the following criteria

1. Proficiency in English: Delegates should possess a strong command of the English language, necessary for formal resolution writing and effective debating.
2. Interest in International Affairs: Participants should demonstrate a keen interest in and knowledge of global issues and international affairs.
3. Research Skills: The ability and enthusiasm to conduct in-depth research on assigned topics are crucial for effective participation.
4. Age Range: Delegates should be between 15 and 19 years of age.

Delegate Selection Procedures

MUN Directors are responsible for conducting delegate selection procedures. These procedures may include interviews or essays to ensure that delegates possess the qualities listed above.

Preparing Delegates for Success:

MUN Directors are encouraged to take proactive steps in preparing their delegates for the conference

1. Leverage Experienced Students: Incorporate experienced MUN students to mentor and support first-time delegates, helping them navigate the MUN experience effectively.
2. Utilize Provided Resources: Make use of the materials and resources provided by MEDIMUN to educate delegates about Model United Nations (MUN) procedures and expectations.
3. Detailed Conference Information: Provide detailed information about the conference, including insights from previous Annual Sessions, to help delegates understand the context and objectives.
4. Assist with Research: Support participants in their resolution drafting and research on MUN and UN-related topics.
5. Group Country Presentations: Schedule group presentations where delegates can share insights about their assigned countries to enhance their understanding of international perspectives.
6. Mock Debates: Organize mock debates to familiarize delegates with the rules of procedure used in MUN conferences, ensuring they are well-prepared for formal debates.
